# LOUISIANA BOARD OF REGENTS 2009-2010 INSTITUTIONAL REPORT FOR THE PREPARATION OF TEACHERS LOUISIANA STATE UNIVERSITY AT ALEXANDRIA

Our teacher preparation programs are also to be commended for the outreach that they have provided to students and teachers in schools that surround their universities. #### **Mission of University**

Louisiana State University at Alexandria (LSUA) offers Central Louisiana access to affordable baccalaureate and associate degrees in a caring environment that challenges students to seek excellence in and bring excellence to their studies and their lives. LSUA is committed to a reciprocal relationship of enrichment with the diverse community it serves.

#### **Student Characteristics of University**

During Fall 2008, the university had a total enrollment of 2,950 undergraduate and 31 graduate students. A total of 860 students were males and 2,121 were females. The majority of the students were from Louisiana with a total of 2,944 in-state students, 31 out-of-state students, and 6 foreign students. Among students enrolled in the undergraduate program, 586 were black, 2,178 were white, and 186 were other races. Among students enrolled in the graduate program, 7\* were black, 22\* were white, and 2\* were other races.

#### **Accreditation and Approval of Teacher Preparation Program**

The university is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS). In addition, the university is seeking initial accreditation from the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE). All of the university's teacher preparation programs are approved by the Board of Regents and the Louisiana Department of Education.

#### Notable Features and Accomplishments of Teacher Preparation Program

- In March 2009, nine teacher candidates, along with their instructor presented a workshop titled *Everything I Needed to Know about Science I Learned in Kindergarten* at the National Science Teachers Association conference in New Orleans. Learning Cycle Model lessons were the basis of the learning center activities presented at the workshop.
- Teacher candidates enrolled in Children's Literature presented an Author Fair for students in an identified elementary school. Candidates also participated in a simplified action research project related to the Author Fair
- Family Math Night (fall 2008) and Family Literacy Night (spring 2009) were held at Mable Brasher Elementary, LSUA's Professional Development School. Events were planned by teacher candidates enrolled in Health and Physical Education Methods incorporated movement into the mathematical and literacy activities.
- The Department of Education faculty collectively was awarded grants totaling \$13,383.82. Grants included support for inter-departmental collaborative efforts to improve secondary certification programs, a Service Learning Community Training Equipment Grant, acquisition of a color printer for the computer lab used by teacher candidates, and purchase of licenses for preparation for PLATO PRAXIS I exams. Additionally, teacher candidates proposed and received a grant award for the purchase of an interactive white board.
- During the fall 2008 and spring 2009 semesters, teacher candidates in Social Studies Methods and Physical Education Methods collaboratively held a Geo-Awareness event for elementary students. Guest participants included members of various university clubs and local cultural groups.

# Notable Features and Accomplishments of Teacher Preparation Program (Cont'd)

- During the fall 2008 and spring 2009 semesters, the teacher candidates from Math Methods I hosted Math Fairs at Tioga Elementary School for the grades 1-6 students.
- Elementary student teachers attended the First Annual Louisiana Statewide Student Teacher Education Conference.
- Dr. Melissa Parks was elected Vice President-Elect of the Dance Division of Louisiana Association of Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance.
- Dr. Julie Gill was elected Chair of the Health Education of the Louisiana Association of Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance.
- The LSUA Department of Education instituted a "Contract for Success" plan to assist teacher candidates having difficulty meeting program entrance requirements.
- The LSUA Department of Education began to offer PRAXIS I and PRAXIS II workshops to provide teacher candidates with PRAXIS assistance.
- In the spring 2009, the candidates in the Curriculum in Early Childhood course hosted a Multicultural Food Fest at the LSUA Children's Center.
- Dr. Callum Johnston and Ms. Susan Myrick participated in a United Way Early Childhood Initiative.
- Dr. Clarence Golemon was awarded the Bolton Award for Teaching Excellence. This award is given to one faculty member each year who exhibits outstanding teaching abilities. This is the highest academic honor awarded on the LSUA campus.
- Dr. Julie Gill made the following presentations: "Physical Activities at Work" at the Central Wellness Works (spring 2009); "Safe Dating" at the Louisiana Association of Student Councils (spring 2009); "How Are You?" at LAHPERD (fall 2008); "Service Learning Faculty Seminar" (fall 2008).
- Dr. Fred Litton made the following presentations: "Recent Developments in the Diagnosis and Assessment of Autism Disorders" La. Association of Educational Diagnosticians Annual Conference (spring 2009); "Children with Disabilities and No Child Left Behind" CEC Conference in Hot Springs, Arkansas (fall 2008).

## LOUISIANA BOARD OF REGENTS 2009-2010 TEACHER PREPARATION ACCOUNTABILITY SYSTEM

## **OVERVIEW**

In compliance with the Higher Education Opportunity Act of 1998, Louisiana created a Teacher Preparation Accountability System to assess the performance of teacher preparation programs within the state. During the first phase (2001-2002) of the accountability system, the performance of the regular and alternate certification students on the state teachers' examination (*Praxis*) was assessed. During subsequent phases (2002-2003, 2003-04, and 2004-05), the *quantity* of program completers at each institution was assessed and the *institutional performance* of each university was examined based upon passage rates on the *Praxis* and survey data from new teachers (who rated their teacher preparation programs on the extent to which the programs prepared the new teachers to address the state standards for teachers). The accountability system was created to include additional factors in the future that would examine growth of achievement of students taught by new teachers and perceptions of mentors of new teachers about the programs that prepared the new teachers. The purpose of the accountability system was to clearly demonstrate to the public that all universities and colleges in Louisiana were working diligently to produce quality teachers who worked effectively with PK-12 students.

During 2005-06, it was not possible to implementation the Teacher Preparation Accountability System due to the closure of universities and schools in Louisiana and the inability to collect data from displaced teachers and mentors due to Hurricane Katrina and Hurricane Rita. A decision was made to revise the Teacher Preparation Accountability System. Institutional data, quantity data, and PRAXIS examination passage rate data have been collected and disseminated to the public in the 2005-06, 2006-07, 2007-08, 2008-09, and 2009-2010 Institutional Reports for the Preparation of Teachers. During 2003-2010, a Value-Added Teacher Preparation Assessment Model has been piloted that links growth of achievement of children taught by new teachers to the universities that prepared the new teachers. Initial results were released to the public during October 2007, December 2008, and August 2009. During 2009-10, the value-added model will be integrated into the Teacher Preparation Accountability System, and the revised Teacher Preparation Accountability System will be piloted during 2009-2010.
